FROM HERE TO THERE

As the New Year gets underway, we have a new budget to follow and goals to accomplish. The board of directors approved our capital and operating budgets at their December board meeting, and staff has begun the process of preparing for the improvements we will be making to our operation. Many of the improvements will be made directly to our electric distribution system while others are technology improvements that will help us do more and offer better service to our members. In short, we are continuing to challenge ourselves to provide safe and reliable electric service while controlling our operating costs.

Our 2018 budget contains over \$1.3 million in capital expenditures. Included are pole replacements, line extensions,

new transformers and reclosers. In addition, the capital budget includes several computer servers to replace outdated units, and test equipment to measure power quality. We are also improving our radio communication system, which will mean improvements at several tower locations and the removal of towers that no longer meet our needs. Our radio communications system is not only for voice communication to our field staff, but it's also utilized to transport metering data back to our main office. An up-to-date communication system is key to our work as an electric utility.

We will also be performing a member satisfaction survey in 2018 to gauge member perception of the service we provide and get feedback that will allow us to ensure we are meeting our members' needs and expectations. We do this survey every three years and it helps us focus on the issues that mean the most

to our members. Please look for more information about the survey in future editions of this magazine.

We have selected Asplundh to provide vegetation management services in 2018. They will focus their efforts in the Rosholt and Tigerton areas. Asplundh is a company we have worked with for several years, and their crew is from the area and works very well with our membership. We are pleased they were selected from a group of bidders this year and look forward to working with them to keep our rights-of-way properly cleared so that we have adequate access to our electric facilities.

These are just some of the projects we have underway for the new year. We remain dedicated to working on programs and services that offer the best value to the membership. Together, we can meet the challenges that lay before us and I look forward to a bright year ahead.

BOARD MEETING SUMMARY

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative was held at the headquarters in Rosholt at 8 a.m. on November 30, 2017. The following is a summary of the meeting activities. The agenda, minutes of the October 26, 2017, meeting, new and terminated memberships, and the monthly safety report were approved.

Action Items

- a. Monthly Financial Statements and Reports were approved. Finance Committee reviewed checks written and the board and CEO expenses.
- b. Governance Committee continued reviewing Chapter 7.0 Construction Policy of the Service Rules and Regulations along with Dispute Resolution Policy and the Outdoor Lighting Schedule.
- c. The board approved the 2018 Nominations Committee Meeting be held Saturday, January 20, 2018, at the headquarters.
- d. The 2018 ACRE Membership Drive was discussed and directors' participation was noted.
- e. The board approved attendance at the WECA Education & Lobby Days February 14–15, 2018 in Madison, WI.
- f. The 2018 Annual Goals were presented by each department. The staff will continue to work on the financial and capital budget for the December 2017 regular board meeting.
- g. The board approved all board members' attendance at the Board Leadership training January 11–12, 2018, in Black River Falls.

Operations and Engineering – The crews are working on new connects, underground inspection, LED light upgrades, and pole changes.

Accounting and Finance – Continue to work with all departments to prepare the 2018 budget and goals.

Member Services – School supplies collected at the Member Appreciation Pancake Breakfast were distributed to Rosholt, Wittenberg, Tigerton, and Bowler elementary schools.

President and CEO Report – We are scheduling our last quarterly manager's meeting to be held in Madison and have speakers from various areas of expertise to provide a good diversity of information.

Directors reported on the WECA Annual Meeting, Badger Special Meeting, and the Employee/Safety Meeting.
