Fall Farm and Barn Safety

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When Thunder Roars, Go Indoors!



Lightning is hotter than the surface of the sun; topping out at 50,000 degrees Fahrenheit. It has been a relatively quiet year for storms in the state of Wisconsin, but that does not mean we're safe from lightning, tornados, and flooding.

Storms and tornados can be unpredictable. Once the right conditions come around, chaos can break loose. That is why it is important to have a plan in place to properly respond and react to storms when they hit.

When storms are incoming, it is best to ensure that all of your windows are closed, pets are inside, and decorations are either brought inside or tied down. You do not want to lose decorations, and you most certainly do not want to ruin the inside of your home or car!



The next step is to ensure that your storm safety kit has all the proper items, and head to the basement (or a room without windows). A battery operated radio, food, water, blankets, pillows, necessary medications, and a flashlight are all mandatory when dealing with a storm. This kit will keep you comfortable and safe when the power goes out, or when a serious storm is in bound. Another smart resource is a portable charger for phones, computers, and other small appliances.

The next step is to just wait. If power goes out, you can call your local cooperative at (715) 677-2211. Our crew will do everything they can to restore your power in a timely manner. Aside from that, keep your radio tuned to a local weather station, stay inside, and stay safe.

Additionally, we have partnered with a state certified auditor who can perform comprehensive audits to accurately assess if your home has specific areas of heat loss, lacking insulation, and a host of other diagnoses.

The auditor will provide a report detailing specific needs that must be addressed in your home.

The cost of the professional audit is \$350.00, which the cooperative will reimburse if you complete three of the auditors suggested measures. \$150 for the first, and \$100 for the second and third. Each member of the cooperative qualifies for one audit every five years.
