Deer hunting season in Wisconsin is just around the corner so it's time to sight in your rifles and get ready for the big hunt. At the October CWEC board meeting, the Board of Directors approved the retirement of capital credits in the amount of \$250,000. Capital credits are the margins distributed to the members of the cooperative based on their energy purchases from the cooperative in previous years. The capital credit retirement this year will be made by applying 70% of the retirement to the oldest year on record and 30% of the retirement to more recent years. This method provides a fair



retirement rotation and allows us to clear older years off the books.

When we retire capital credits, a small number of former members cannot be located and their retired capital credit amount is unclaimed. Per Wisconsin statute, we are able to use our unclaimed capital credits for charitable giving and scholarships. We donate our unclaimed dollars to Federated Youth Foundation in accordance with the provisions of our bylaws, and those dollars are available to CWEC to help our local communities and students achieve their goals. This has a tremendous impact on our rural communities.

One of the most beneficial and rewarding community service programs we participate in is the Toys for Tots program. Your generous donation of toys has put smiles on the faces of thousands of children since the program began. With Christmas just around the corner, our Toys for Tots campaign has begun. These toys will find their way into the hands of deserving children in our area. Thank you for continuing to support our local families.

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative was held at 7:52 a.m. on August 21, 2024. The following is a summary of the meeting activities. The agenda, minutes of the July 25, 2024, meeting, new and terminated memberships, and the monthly safety and compliance report were approved.

Action Items

- a. Monthly Financial Statements and Reports were reviewed by the Finance Committee.
- b. Board Policy 107 Committee Assignments were reviewed.
- c. Director Allen Zander was chosen as the voting delegate for the NRECA District 5 regional meeting. Votes will be cast for Shane Larson, Director Candidate, and William Roberts, At-Large Candidate.

Operations and Engineering – Mr. Kurtzweil submitted a written report. The new bucket truck was delivered. Weekly meetings are being held with Eaton to troubleshoot issues we are still having with the AMI meters. Water heater LMR removals continue with a total of 711 removed as of August 15, 2024.

Accounting and Finance – Financial reports were presented by Ms. Claussen. There were 39 disconnects in August. The PCA for June was 0.00822.

Member Services – Ms. Mazemke submitted a written report. The opening on the MAG Committee for Sub-District 3c, townships of Kronenwetter, Reid, Knowlton, Guenther, and Bevent has been filled. There will be a Joint Committee Dinner on Tuesday, October 15, 2024.

around 140 search and rescue dogs and their handlers converged on the Wisconsin Lions Camp in Rosholt for search and rescue training sessions. The event, with participants from 27 states, was hosted by the Illinois Wisconsin Search Dogs (ILLWIS) organization, which has been around for 38 years.

"They're coming from Washington, California, Florida, Texas, so we pretty much have all corners of the country represented," said Dennis Schenk, K9 handler with ILLWIS, who is also a past president of the national organization of canine search and recovery.

Schenk, who resides in Rosholt, helped plan this year's annual training event. It was the third time the training was held in Rosholt. The event was also held in Rosholt in 2011 and 2016.

With the help of volunteers, who were strategically placed throughout the 440 acres of camp property, the K9 handlers and their dogs used the scent of the volunteers for the dogs to search for and rescue the volunteer victims. The training was meant to simulate a search and rescue operation a handler and their dog would have with law enforcement, fire departments, and other rescue groups in locating missing people.

"It's (training) important because of what we do," Schenk said. "It's life or death basically. It's important for even an experienced dog to keep up their level of training. It's just as important for a beginning dog to build a solid foundation."

Jodi Brumer, an administrative assistant at Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC), was one of the

volunteer victims. She worked with the advanced search and rescue teams for building searches. She pretended to be missing in a dark building with no windows for one search. In another search she hid on top of items in a building because the instructor wanted the dogs to search for someone who wasn't on the ground.

"I felt grateful to play a small part in the training of these dogs for one of the most important jobs they could ever do," Brumer said. "I was very impressed at how the handlers worked with their dogs. They each had their own way of communicating. I learned that dogs use their sense of smell more than their eyesight. As the dogs got closer to me their breathing changed. I enjoyed being found/rescued to see how much hard work goes into training the dogs."

Al Zander, a board director for CWEC, also volunteered to be a "missing" person. Zander spent two days working with a group of two instructors and eight dogs and their handlers. He hid in the woods, pretending to be missing.

"I gained a huge appreciation for what they do; all were volunteers and they never charge for their services," Zander said. "I assumed when I was told I was working with a group of scent trackers it would be hounds but was surprised at the variety of dogs used."

Search and rescue dogs and their handlers do need to be certified, Schenk said, adding that the annual training event is meant to help prepare them for their certification testing.

"The mission of the national organization is to provide quality training and networking," Schenk said.

The different types of search and rescue training that took place at the event included tracking, air scent in the wilderness, cadaver, and land and water.

In addition to training taking place on the Wisconsin Lions Camp property, Schenk said local rural property owners

allowed training to take place on their properties. The Portage County Fair-grounds in Rosholt was also used for the training event.

"The feedback I've been getting has been fantastic for the training," Schenk said.

Not only was Schenk thankful for all the facilities that were used for the training, but he said sponsorships were also important for the success of the training.

"It's expensive putting something like this on," Schenk said. "We try to keep the registration fees low because everyone is a volunteer, so it's all on their own dime."

CWEC was one of the sponsors, as it sponsored the welcome dinner the Sunday night prior to the start of training.

"Community support has just been tremendous," Schenk said. "Not only the camp and the staff here, but just community support has really been great, and it really helps the event go smooth."

Phillip Potter, hospitality director for the Wisconsin Lions Foundation, said having the event at the Wisconsin Lions Camp helps fund the activities held at the camp for children and adults with disabilities, but it also allows networking to take place.

"A lot of what we do at the foundation here is service oriented,

so people are also learning about what we do here, which is fabulous," Potter said.

He added, "The Wisconsin Lions Camp, we work with five different disabilities. We work with children and adults who are deaf or hard of hearing, children and adults who are blind or vision impaired, children and young adults with intellectual disabilities or autism, children with epilepsy, and children with diabetes. All of our campers come here completely free, so there is no cost for any of our campers to come here. One of the ways we raise revenue is by holding events and rentals, retreats and conferences. By the search and rescue team choosing our location, it's helping to send more campers to camp."
